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Vision Screening Project/Spot Camera Interest Meeting Summary

An interest meeting was held on Wednesday, March 11, 2020, for the Concord Lions Clubs' Vision Screening Project committee. The meeting was held at Lion Diann Norwood's home. Members present were John Nunn, Solomon Hall, Richard Rogers, Diann Norwood, Elizabeth Schavillie, Joe Poirier (co-chairperson) and Kathy Poirier (chairperson). Other members interested in being on the committee but unable to attend were Ron Staley, Dianne Culp and George Culp.

Topics discussed during the meeting:

Participation – All club members will be encouraged to be involved in the project in some capacity. This can include eye screening teams, compiling lists of potential screening locations and contacts, making phone calls to said contacts, record keeping, etc.

Fundraising – Fundraising needs to be ongoing in order to purchase the Spot camera and a printer. By continuing to raise funds the club would eventually be able to purchase a second camera which would then allow for increasing the number of screenings being done at any one time.

Eye Screening Locations – A list of potential screening sites and contact people needs to be compiled. Initial screening locations would include local church pre-schools, child development centers, private schools, daycare centers, Headstart programs (?), and the Cabarrus County Home School Association (?).

Budget – A budget would need to be set up to cover ongoing costs (i.e., printer paper, extra printer cartridges, funds for covering the cost of eye exams/glasses for children with financial need who are referred for further examination [these would need to be vetted through social services]). John Nunn said currently we're working with five to six doctors in the area. We have an agreement with them that the club pays \$200 towards an exam/glasses.

Marketing – Ideas were discussed as to how to market the service we will be providing. Diann Norwood and Solomon Hall agreed to work together on marketing. Diann suggested having a tri-fold pamphlet to hand out to promote the eye screenings. Solomon suggested putting together a short video that could be shown to school directors when personally meeting with them to discuss having a screening at their school(s). In addition, providing a live demonstration of the camera at the time of the meeting would be another way to market the program.

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
Happy April Fool's Day

Although April Fools' Day, also called All Fools' Day, has been celebrated for several centuries by different cultures, its exact origins remain a mystery.

Some historians speculate that April Fools' Day dates back to 1582, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar, as called for by the Council of Trent in 1563.

People who were slow to get the news or failed to recognize that the start of the new year had moved to January 1 and continued to celebrate it during the last week of March through April 1 became the butt of jokes and

hoaxes.

These pranks included having paper fish placed on their backs and being referred to as "poisson d'avril" (April fish), said to symbolize a young, easily caught fish and a gullible person. Historians have also linked April Fools' Day to festivals such as Hilaria, which was celebrated in ancient Rome at the end of March and involved people dressing up in disguises.

There's also speculation that April Fools' Day was tied to the vernal equinox, or first day of spring in the Northern Hemisphere, when Mother Nature fooled people with changing, unpredictable weather.

April Fools' Day spread throughout Britain during the 18th century. In Scotland, the tradition became a two-day event, starting with "hunting the gowk," in which people were sent on phony errands (gowk is a word for cuckoo bird, a symbol for fool) and followed by Tailie Day, which involved pranks played on people's derrieres, such as pinning fake tails or "kick me" signs on them.

In modern times, people have gone to great lengths to create elaborate April Fools' Day hoaxes. Newspapers, radio and TV stations and Web sites have participated in the April 1 tradition of reporting outrageous fictional claims that have fooled their audiences.

In 1957, the BBC reported that Swiss farmers were experiencing a record spaghetti crop and showed footage of people harvesting noodles from trees; numerous viewers were fooled. In 1985, Sports Illustrated tricked many of its readers when it ran a made-up article about a rookie pitcher named Sidd Finch who could throw a fastball over 168 miles per hour.

In 1996, Taco Bell, the fast-food restaurant chain, duped people when it announced it had agreed to purchase Philadelphia's Liberty Bell and intended to rename it the Taco Liberty Bell. In 1998, after Burger King advertised a "Left-Handed Whopper," scores of clueless customers requested the fake sandwich.
