together to make it successful.



We are happy to report that the Spot Vision Screener and printer have been ordered and are being shipped. This is exciting news as this means we can now move forward with implementing our program in the community.


Again, thank you, thank you, thank you!!! Together we will make this program work and continue to follow the Lions motto, We Serve!


Trivia

around lunchtime every other Saturday, when the residents are gathered in the small cafeteria near the piano. Even when I have been busy with schoolwork or tired from football or wrestling practice, I prioritize going to Taylor

Glen, and no matter what mood I'm in before I enter the sliding doors of the building, I'm

always in a good one when I leave.

I've studied piano since I was seven years old, and now play at the National Federation of Music Clubs Difficult 2 level. I play a varied repertoire that include jazz, classical and romantic pieces, and popular music. But one song in particular, Melody Bober's Magnificent Minnesota, is more meaningful to me that the others. Soon after I began performing it at Taylor Glen, one elderly lady, Mrs. Sandy, came over to ask that I play it again. She said that it was her favorite, and she requested that I play it the next time I visited. On my subsequent visits, I would smile at her and then start with the piece before she had a chance to ask. The look on her face was enough to tell me she enjoyed it. She and I became friends, and she began to sit in a chair next to me as I played. One visit, however, I noticed that Mrs. Sandy wasn't there, which had never happened before, so I asked about her. One of the caretakers told me she was ill but would bring her over for that day's performance. Mrs. Sandy was wheeled in on a bed and looked tired, but still smiled. It was the last time that we would share our love of Magnificent Minnesota. She passed away before my next visit to Taylor Glen.

My memories of the look of joy on Mrs. Sandy's face as I filled the room with music is still comforting and inspiring. Those memories give more meaning to my visits to Taylor Glen. My friendship with her showed me that even small gestures, like playing a song, or sharing a smile or a word of encouragement, can mean a great deal to someone. Knowing her has also helped me experience the personal joy that come from actively caring about people by investing time in them. I'm happy that my ability to play the piano presented me with the opportunity to share it. Mrs. Sandy has inspired me to look for other ways that I can use my time and talents to benefit others.

I wanted to send a thank you for the Lions Centennial Scholarship. I really appreciate having been selected to receive such a generous scholarship. The Lions Club is such a well-regarded organization, and it's an honor to have met their standards. I will make the most of the opportunities that it offers during my time at Duke. Thank you again.

I hope the members of our club can see what a wonderful candidate the CHS committee has presented. I feel that Peter will represent our motto "We Serve" well.
