Concord Lions Legacy Scholarship

In 2017, Concord Lions instituted a legacy scholarship to honor the 100th anniversary of Lions Clubs. The Lions Centennial Scholarship was created to honor a graduating senior who has contributed to his or her community through service. The scholarship is issued for up to four years while enrolled in a post-secondary education or training (2- or 4-year program or trade certification program). The scholarship may be continued for up to four years upon report of continuing academic performance with a GPA of 2.5 or higher and continued community service.

In order to be selected for this scholarship, the student must be involved in service to others, have a high school GPA of 2.5 or higher, and be enrolled in a post-secondary educational program to begin in the Fall following their senior year graduation.

- The last weekend of May found many of you on the streets of Concord displaying American flags. Memorial Day required 617 flags which saw teams start as early as Wednesday to get them out on time for the weekend. THANK YOU those who ran the routes.
- While preparing for the display your editor stumbled upon a tattered flag on a worn pole on East Corban. I had noticed that it had remained outside for several years.
- I contacted Martha McGee Matthews and posed the question of asking if I could replace the tattered flag. Here is her response:
- That particular flag at 168 has been there for at least 6 years day-in and day-out. My father, JW(Mickey) McGee first began having a flag there after he moved



there in 1988. But I could not tell you IF or when he engaged the Lions Club Services. He passed away in 2015. I just paid for it to honor his memory. He was a World War II veteran, captain of a field artillery battalion in Germany serving under General Patten. Proud to be an Ameri-



can. He usually flew a NC flag and an Irish flag up at the house.

A new replacement flag in my Dad's honor would be most appreciated. I would like for it to remain there as it has these many years. Incidentally, my grandfather Robert E (Bob) Lee, built the house at 168 Corban Ave. He was a Navy veteran of World War I. He was my mother's father. So the flag honors him as well.

As a volunteer in service, one may never know the impact our actions may have on others. Today, a new flag is flying day and night at 168 E Corban.



Eyeglass Sorting and Volunteer Week at Camp Dogwood

- Camp Director Tammy Thomas reported a successful volunteer week at Camp Dogwood She expressed her thanks to those who came out during the Spring Volunteer Maintenance Week and Eyeglass Sorting. She also thanked those who wanted to attend and could not due to maintaining CDC Guidelines to stay in compliance with the Governors Executive Orders.
- The volunteers who attended were able to complete power washing, electrical, and gardening projects. Eyeglass sorting was also a big success. Volunteers sorted approximately **6500** pounds of glasses. Nonprescription sunglasses and reading glasses were kept at Camp Dogwood for dispensing on the vision van. Prescription glasses are sent to a recycling center in Indiana. From the recycling center, glasses are then distributed to missionaries etc. at a discounted price to go overseas to those in need. The discounted price charged per pair of glasses helps cover the cost of employees at the recycling center and shipping cost to get the glasses to Indiana.

Representing our club were Lions Joe and Kathy who volunteered a combined thirty-four hours.

Tammy said, "Thank you again for all you do throughout the year to support NC Lions and Camp Dogwood. Each of you is GREAT!!!!!"
